Thinking Locally

Under the guidance and direction of the GPCF Investment
Committee, the Foundation shifted over \$10 million in long-term assets to two local investment firms, Grinnell Wealth
Management and Edward Jones.

Relationship building is important to GPCF. We partner with financial advisors and donors to help maximize tax benefits and connect donors to causes they care about. GEP initiatives have a lasting effect on our communities and GPCF is proud of the history and future of the partnership.

The Build a Better Grinnell 2030 Community Needs Assessment is a coalition focused on identifying and addressing Grinnell's most pressing needs to ensure our community continues to thrive. GPCF is one of the many community partners coordinating the work of this important process.
